You Asked, We Answered

Under AS 24.10.110, may a legislator use an office account to print or distribute a newsletter within 60 days of an election?

Yes. AS 24.60.030(c) specifically exempts an office allowance account from the restriction on the use of state funds to print or distribute a political mass mailing within 60 days of an election by a legislator who is a candidate in that election. There is no firm cutoff date for the actual mailing of a legislative news-letter. The closer the mailing is to the election, the more scrutiny from the committee would occur in the event a complaint is filed. In any case, the news-letter should not be distributed fewer than 30 days before the election.

Is a legislator who is not a candidate in a primary election restricted from sending a constituent newsletter during the campaign period as defined in AS 24.60.030(c)?

No. The restriction under AS 24.60.030(c) on the use of state funds and resources for a political mass mailing would not apply at any time during the year to a legislator who is not a candidate in either the primary or general election.

Note that a legislator who is a candidate only in the general election (does not appear on the primary ballot) is also restricted from political mass mailings and the use of state resources during the time period before the primary election.

May a legislator use state resources to print or distribute a newsletter within 60 days of the election?

Under AS 24.60.030(c), a legislator may not use state funds, other than the funds under AS 24.10.110, to print or distribute a political mass mailing during a campaign period for an election in which the legislator is a candidate.

A mass mailing is considered political if it is from or about a legislator who is a candidate for election. This restriction would include the Print Shop and/or a legislative office printer to produce a newsletter.

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You Asked, We Answered

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May a legislator print birthday cards for mailing to individuals in the print shop during a campaign period under AS 24.60.030(c)?

Yes. The restriction in AS 24.60.030(c) is for printing a political mass mailing during the period that begins 60 days before the primary election and generally ends after the November election. Cards sent to individuals throughout the year to recognize birthdays are not considered a mass mailing under statutory language.

If a legislator does not have an opponent in either the primary or general election, do the same prohibitions regarding newsletters apply?

Yes. Regardless of whether a sitting legislator has a campaign opponent or not, all restrictions and prohibitions in the Act apply.

May a legislator copy email addresses and other information from a legislative database of constituents for campaign purposes?

Yes. A legislator may use constituent information gathered by a legislator using legislative resources and copy and use that information for personal or campaign use under advice given in AO 04-01. This would include email addresses.

May a legislator use messages and article pieces from legislative newsletters of the legislator if the legislative contact information is stripped from the original source?

Yes. Note that a *campaign worker* must strip out the legislative contact information from the original sources as opposed to a legislative staffer on government time.

Legislative Purpose Test

Before taking action or accepting a gift of travel, ask yourself:

- What is the legislative purpose of my action?
- Is the activity or service necessary to perform my official duties?

If not, do not take action or accept a gift of travel.

Remember:

- There is no definition of "legislative purpose" in the Legislative Ethics Act.
- Each situation may need to be determined on a case-by-case basis.
- Several statutes and formal advisory opinions provide guidance.

File Your Ethics Disclosures Online

- 1. Go to <u>http://intranet.akleg.gov/</u> and scroll down to "File now" under the "File an Ethics Disclosure" section.
- 2. Go to the line that begins with "Click HERE."
- 3. Double click on the word "HERE."
- 4. Enter your credentials (your computer log-in).
- 5. Click on the type of disclosure you want to file.
- 6. Complete the form using drop down menus when available. (Provide complete information. Gifts of travel are for the purpose of obtaining information about matters of legislative concern. Include one or two sentences about how the information you obtained is a matter of legislative concern.)
- 7. Check your completed disclosure for accuracy and submit.

Reminder: Disclosures required for new associations

Disclosures must be filed within 30 days of the beginning of an association regardless of whether it's during session, a recess, or the interim.

Board memberships (within 30 days of the beginning of the association). *Example:* A legislator or legislative employee is elected to a condo association board on July 12, 2020.

Close economic associations (both parties must file a disclosure within 30 days of the beginning of the association). *Example:* A legislator purchases a piece of artwork worth \$250 or more from a legislative employee on August 15, 2020.

State Benefit and Loan Programs (within 30 days of the beginning of participation). *Example:* A legislator or legislative employee receives a new commercial fishing loan on May 30, 2020.

State Contracts, Leases, and Grants (within 30 days of the beginning of the association). *Example:* A legislator or legislative employee renegotiates a state contract on July 1, 2020.
